The discussion will also spotlight current civil rights litigation that underscores the real-world stakes for constitutional protections and democratic processes. 1. Understanding these dynamics helps practitioners maintain and advocate for stable legal processes that support public trust—an anchor of constitutional democracy. 2. Illuminates the Real-World Stakes for Constitutional Rights Featuring insights from leaders involved in active civil rights litigation, the program shows how litigation strategies and court decisions directly affect the protection of fundamental rights—voting, due process, equal protection, and more.
